O. 503, San Francisco, California, writes: "The WIGGINS family cemetery was set aside by HUNDLEY WIGGINS on his plantation (at Lone Star, Texas, between Summerfield and New Salem, in Cherokee County) about 1850. Mrs. Ina Wiggins Eddings of Nacogdoches, Texas, has a will made by Hundley Wiggins which set aside the burying ground, and parceled the several sections of land among his sons and his slaves.

HUNDLEY WIGGINS, who was born in 1786, probably in N. C., and married Nancy _____ (1800-1873), was the son of FREDERICK WIGGINS, who lived at Granville or Greenville, North Carolina.

Hundley Wiggins had 8 children--6 sons and 2 daughters:

The sons were:

1. JAMES F. WIGGINS (1823-1876), born near Shelbyville, Bedford Co., Tenn.
2. RANSON H. WIGGINS, m. MARY GARRET (1837-1880)
3. WILLIAM C. WIGGINS (1832-1870) m. LOU WREN (?)

5. HARREL WIGGINS (1827-1877) m. FRANCES TAYLOR
6. JOHN WIGGINS m. ALICE HARRINGTON (my great grandparents)

CLIMBING THE FAMILY TREE:

Hugh S. Watson, Jr., 2114 Chestnut Ave., Newport News, Va., is writing an excellent genealogical column, called "Climbing the Family Tree," in the DAILY PRESS, Newport News, Va. (A sample copy was obtained by sending 25¢ to the paper in coin.) Not only does Mr. Watson publish questions and answers of genealogical interest, but he gives helpful hints to the family historian as well. DEFINITIONS FROM DR. SAMUEL JOHNSON'S GREAT DICTIONARY:

THE GENEALOGY OF THE SURNAME "YORICK," AS RECORDED BY THE GREAT WIT,
LAURENCE STERNE, IN TRISTRAM SHANDY:

"Yorick was this parson's name, and, what is very remarkable in it, (as appears from a most ancient account of the family, wrote upon strong vellum, and now in perfect preservation), it had been exactly so spelt for near,—I was within an ace of saying nine hundred years;—but I would not shake my credit in telling an improbable truth, however indisputable in itself;—and therefore I shall content myself with only saying—It had been exactly so spelt, without the least variation or transposition of a single letter, for I do not know how long; which is more than I would venture to say of one half of the best surnames in the kingdom; which, in a course of years, have generally undergone as many chops and changes as their owners.—Has this been owing to the pride, or to the shame of the respective proprietors?—In honest truth, I think sometimes to the one, and sometimes to the other, just as the temptation has wrought. But a villainous affair it is, and will one day so blend and confound us altogether, that no one shall be able to stand up and swear, 'That his own great grandfather was the man who did either this or that.'

This evil had been sufficiently fenced against by the prudent care of the Yorick's family, and their religious preservation of these records I quote, which do farther inform us, That the family was originally of Danish extraction, and had been transplanted into England as early as in the reign of Horwendillus, king of Denmark, in whose court, it seems, an ancestor of this Mr. Yorick's, and from whom he was lineally descended held a considerable post to the day of his death. Of what nature this considerable post was, this record saith not;—It only adds, That, for near two centuries, it had been totally abolished, as altogether unnecessary, not only in that court, but in every other court of the Christian world..."

REPORT OF THE MARCH 31, 1958, MEETING:

The insignia is suspended from a blue and gray ribbon--the blue representing the color of the Navy and the gray, the color worn by the Army during the War of 1812.

Mrs. Stephens announced that there is being organized a Texas branch of the General Society of the War of 1812. This means the Men's organization. Mr. Tevis Smith of Brownwood began the work of organizing in Texas and has two members from Fort Worth, Mr. Marvin Nichols and Mr. Uel Stephens, Jr. Mr. Smith was injured in an automobile accident and had to give up the work. Col. Frederick W. Huntington, 835 Burr Road, San Antonio, Texas, a former State President of S. A. R., is now carrying on this work should any gentlemen be interested.

Mrs. G. E. Burritt, Chairman of the recent exhibit of Heraldry and Genealogical Material, held by the Fort Worth Genealogical Society was commended for the excellent display she arranged and presided over during the exhibit.

An announcement of a BASIC COURSE IN GENEALOGY, presented by the Adult Education Division of the Fort Worth Public Library, under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Holcomb, Adult Education Director, to be taught by Mr. and Mrs. I. H. Beauchamp, was distributed. The classes are to be held on Thursday nights, beginning at 7:30 P. M., April 10—May 29, 1958, in the auditorium of the Fort Worth Public Library. There is no charge for these lessons in genealogy and anyone interested is invited to attend any or all of these classes.

YATES FAMILY HISTORY:

Contributed by Mrs. Frank Estill, Route 1, Box 195, Smithfield, Texas

The name Yate or Yates originated when people lived in walled cities, and a man living near the entrance was called John Gate. Gate and Yate sound very much alike and some people would write a capital "G" which looked similar to a "Y," so in generations later, the descendants of this John Gate were sometimes called Yate.

The immigrant George Yate came from Berkshire, England, before 1664, as on March 2, 1664, he was chosen a juror of the Provincial Court. He was a Deputy Provincial Surveyor of Maryland in 1671. In his will of 1691, left his "Son George my seal ring with the coat of arms upon it."

"The Crest of the Yates in Berkshire" (to quote from WARFIELD OF MARYLAND, written by Prof. Joshua D. Warfield) is a stag head out of a Coronet."

George Yate, Sr. (c 1650-1691), m. c 1672/3, Mary (Wells) Stockett, d. 1698; Mary, widow of Capt. Thomas Stockett, was a daughter of Richard and Frances Wells of Herring Creek. George and Mary Yate had two sons and a daughter; George Yate, Jr., John and Ann who died young.

George Yate, Jr., (1674-1717) m. c 1700, Rachel Warfield (1681-1709). Rachel was a daughter of Richard and Elinor (Browne) Warfield. Richard, the founder of the Warfield family in Maryland, was born in Berkshire, Eng. Elinor was a daughter of Capt. John Browne, a Mariner of London. The children of George, Jr., and Rachel were: (1) George III, (2) Joshua, (3) Samuel, (4) Benjamin, (5) Mary, (6) Elinor, and (7) Rachel.

Now they are called Yates.

I have found out much additional information through the paper, that I probably would not have received by just writing letters. Genealogy is a selling job, just like everything else, you have to create the desire to want it; to so many people it means absolutely nothing. I have enjoyed the project and have worked hard at it, and it is a better past-time than going to the corner bar and drinking beer. Nuf said?

MAG., Vol. 4, August 1903, (London: Elliot Stock, 62, Paternoster Row.)

EXCERPTS FROM THE PAPER BY ROBERT BELL, ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF THE FORT WORTH PUBLIC LIBRARY ON "MICROREPRODUCTION IN THE FORT WORTH PUBLIC LIBRARY":

There are several varieties of microreproduction, all essentially involving the same principle of reducing photographically printed matter to a fraction of its size. The two major divisions of microreproduction are transparent and opaque, requiring, of course, different types of equipment to read the film.

Of the transparent, the first and most familiar development was microfilm. This is most ordinarily used for newspaper and magazine reproduction, because the nature of the material is such that prolonged searching through many issues is often necessary, and cards would be difficult to handle. This is true also with the census reports, with which all of you are familiar.

The opaque has two forms in current favor, the by now familiar microcard, extremely useful for photographing short books, monographs, and other such items, and microprint, which is coming to be used extensively for books, technical reports and some serials.

Many persons from both the public and library profession have voiced objections to microreproduction, feeling that there should be no substitute for the book. Even these persons, however, will agree that the major advantage is the space saving. No one can argue this when they compare one year of the NEW YORK TIMES filmed with one year of the same newspaper bound.

However, there are other elements of value with or without the space consideration.

Chief above space actually I would consider the acquisition of otherwise unobtainable materials. Almost everything can be put on microfilm if the necessary permission is acquired...Another value is the preservation of perishable records, including the added risk of excessive handling of flimsy records...And another value which is certainly not to be under-estimated is the expense factor. Many books, while not exceedingly rare are scarce and therefore expensive...For example, a scarce Civil War item, Kate Cumming's A JOURNAL OF HOSPITAL LIFE IN THE CONFEDERATE ARMY OF TENNESSEE, I have seen advertised for as much as \$20.00, while we recently acquired it on microfilm for around \$2.50...

JULIET F., b. June 16, 1853.

THOMAS WILLIS, b. Nov. 4, 1855; d. March 3, 1923.

REGION, b. 22 Mar. 1813; married 2 Oct. 1834 to JANE STRICKLAND in Maury Co., Tenn.—NANCY REGION, b. 15 Nov. 1819—WILLIAM REGION, b. 16 Mar. 1825; married ISABELLA ANDERSON.—MARY MARS REGION, b. 3 Dec. 1828, married Nov. 1845 to PERKINS C. SAVAGE.—JOEL MARTHEUS REGION, b. 3 Sept. 1832, married MARY JANE BRICKLE.—ELIZABETH CATHERINE REGION, b. 17 Jan. 1837, married JESS J. SAVAGE. Mrs. Beauchamp has the death dates of the last three children.

GREENFIELD, SANDFORD, NAPIER, DORSETT: Mrs. Imon Beauchamp, 201 Trinity Avenue, Weatherford, Texas, would also like information on THOMAS T. GREENFIELD from Maryland, born 1744, who died in Maury Co., Tenn., 15 Nov. 1825. His son, GERRARD TRUMAN GREENFIELD, b. 1783, in Virginia, who lived in Maryland, later moved to Maury Co., Tenn., in 1812. His wife's name was KARON SANDFORD, the daughter of JAMES T. SANDFORD. Karon died in 1831 and GERRARD TRUMAN GREENFIELD married JANE HAWKINS YOUNG DORSETT, a native of Maryland, but they lived in Maury Co., Tenn. GERRARD TRUMAN GREENFIELD died 25 Feb. 1847; he had one daughter, REBECCA GREENFIELD who married a NAPIER in Maury Co., Tenn., in 1844. He also had two sons called TOM and JIM GREENFIELD, who owned all the property at one time in Greenfield Bend, Maury Co., Tenn. Mrs. Beauchamp is the granddaughter of JIM GREENFIELD.

They had several children. PHOEBE BEST was originally from Kentucky. Two of their children were JOHN MOUSER, b. 1818, and ISAAC MOUSER, b. 1820. Both of these children reared families in Hempstead, Ark.

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THE FAMILY RECORD OF A HERO OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS,
MAJOR DAVID MURPHREE, WHO FOUGHT IN THE BATTLE OF SAN JACINTO

On April 2, 1811, in Bedford County, Tennessee, Stephen Murphree married Rebecca (Brooks) Ledbetter, a widow with one son, Hamilton Ledbetter. In the Bedford County home of Stephen and Rebecca Murphree eleven children were born to this union and all lived to be grown and married.

The Children of Stephen Murphree and Rebecca (Brooks) Murphree

1. Sarah "Sallie" Murphree, born 26 May 1813; married 29 Oct. 1828, Dr. West.
2. Elizabeth Murphree, born 9 February 1815; married 18 Nov. 1841, to a Mr. Bennett.
3. Louisa Murphree, born 18 January 1819; married 8 Nov. 1836, to Martin Alexander; died 25 July 1855.
4. Sophia W. Murphree, born 5 April 1821; married 28 Feb. 1841, to Andrew W. White; died 27 Nov. 1848.
5. William Thomas "Tom" Murphree, married 1stly, Elizabeth Baker, 11 Dec. 1854; married 2ndly, her sister, Eudora Baker; married 3rdly, Ophelia North, 4 August 1863.
6. John B. Murphree, married 8 Jan. 1845, Sarah Ann Smith; died Feb., 1855.
7. Major David Murphree, married Columbia, Brazoria Co., Texas, 8 January 1845, Margaret Patton, daughter of Columbus R. Patton.
8. Ann Mary Murphree, born 15 July 1823; married 20 May 1845, John C. Crenshaw.
9. Frances Melvina Murphree, married January 1844, to Edward C. Pettus.
10. Jane Amanda Murphree married Sim Carothers.
11. Virginia Murphree married 23 Sept. 1852, James Brown Smith, brother of Sarah Ann Smith, who married #6 above, John B. Murphree.

David Murphree served in the Texas Colonial army from Dec. 10, 1835, until Feb. 10, 1836. He enlisted in the army March 16, 1836, and was in Captain Patton's army. On April 10, 1836, he was promoted to first lieutenant. Captain Patton was called to Houston's staff as aide-de-camp just before the Battle of San Jacinto and Lieutenant Murphree commanded his company during the engagement.

Mr. Murphree settled in Bexar County after receiving his discharge from the army and in 1837-8 was chairman of the board of land commissioners for Bexar County. After his marriage to Margaret Patton, daughter of Columbus R. Patton, he moved to Victoria. In 1842 Mr. Murphree participated, first in the Vasquez campaign, and later as major commanded a battalion in the Somervell expedition. He served as chief justice of Victoria County, and was regarded as one of the most prominent citizens of Victoria up to the time of his removal to Princess Creek, just across the line in DeWitt County. His wife died during the Civil War and his youngest son, Alex, was killed in the battle in Louisiana. In 1865 Major Murphree went to Missouri, whither he had sent a drove of horses to be sold, and while enroute in the southern part of that state he was assassinated by Unionists.

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REPORT OF THE JULY 28, 1958, FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MEETING:

Miss Willie Victor Briant, president of the Julia Jackson Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy, spoke on "The History and Genealogical Records of the United Daughters of the Confederacy." Miss Briant gave many sources of historical proof of Confederate service and told how to obtain it.

A workshop discussion of family newspapers and other projects of various members of the society was held before the meeting adjourned at 8:45 P. M.

EXCERPTS FROM "THE HISTORY AND GENEALOGICAL RECORDS OF THE UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY" PAPER GIVEN BY MISS WILLIE VICTOR BRIANT BEFORE THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, JULY 28, 1958:

"General Robert E. Lee left this message to every daughter, 'Remember it is your duty to see that the true history of the South is presented to the future generations.'

History has declared that our Confederate soldiers have never been surpassed in bravery, self-denial, and courage. We daughters carry on our work to the world in their memory...We do not think of our Confederate soldiers as having taken part in a Civil War but in a War between the States.

How the United Daughters of the Confederacy received its name is related in the United Daughters of the Confederacy Magazine of November, 1952, page 21. While touring the south, Jefferson Davis, the first and the last President of the Confederate States of America, was too ill to address the crowd. So General Gordon placed his arm on the beautiful, winsome daughter of President Davis and introducing her said, 'My countrymen, I want to introduce you to the daughter of the Confederacy, Miss Winnie Davis.' The name has been used ever since...

The United Daughters of the Confederacy was organized, September 10, 1894, at Nashville, Tennessee. (This last statement taken from CONFEDERATE CATECHISM, page 15).

Now the important thing to discuss is how to find records needed for membership. Our 1958 U. C. C. Annual, Texas Division, states: 'Those eligible are women no less than 16 years of age who are widows, sisters, nieces, grand nieces, great grand nieces or lineal descendants of such men or women who served honorably in the Confederate Army, Navy, or Civil Service. There were some who were too ill or too old to do active service but did their duty in the Home Guard. Northern women who married Confederate soldiers after 1861, if they wish to join, are given all the rights and privileges except they cannot hold office, cannot vote, and do not pay dues. They are called Honorary Members.'

Historical Proof and how to get it (taken from the 1958 U. D. C. ANNUAL, TEXAS DIVISION; Page 185)--

1. Affidavit from Chairman, State Historical Department.
2. Certified proof from National Archives and Records Department, in Washington, D. C.
3. Record of any Registered Application paper in the General File, stamped 'Official Record on File'.
4. Certified copy of current History, as recorded in some published work of recognized authenticity. Give name, author, volume, and page.
5. Records on tombstones--give location of grave--certified copy of your

relationship to him and the service he rendered in the War.

6. Certified Copy of Confederate Veteran's Pension Application, if granted; (if it has No. on it, you will know his War Record is on file).
7. Certified proofs from Rosters from Camps of Confederate Veterans. (The Robert E. Lee Camp disbanded leaving their records, documents, and letters to the Julia Jackson Chapter. The latter voted to present the material to the Fort Worth Public Library. The records are of inestimable value for dates.)
8. Certified copy of your ancestor's Cross of Honor Application. Give proof of relationship.
9. Bible records alone not taken.
10. Word of mouth or tradition not accepted.
11. (I can vouch for this one.) If your ancestor enlisted from Louisiana, then his name and the service he rendered will be listed in BOOTH'S LOUISIANA CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS AND LOUISIANA CONFEDERATE COMMANDS. (In the Fort Worth Public Library, three volumes).
12. Copy of ancestor's will.
13. If all these suggestions fail, then it would be well to consult a genealogist--you will have missed much work and much fun. They will get the proof if possible.
14. The Georgia Records were destroyed when Atlanta was burned. I understand there are two books of Georgia Records, one of which is in the Fort Worth Public Library. The book is HISTORY OF DOLES-COOK BRIGADE. It contains the Muster Rolls of the 4, 12, 21, and 44 Georgia Regiments with a short sketch of the services of each member and a complete history of each regiment, by one of its own members. The author is Henry W. Thomas of the 12th Georgia Regiment."

EXCERPTS FROM THE PAPER ON "SURNAME"
GIVEN BY DR. JOSIAH H. COMBS BEFORE THE SOCIETY, AUGUST 25, 1958:

The adoption of surnames, or family names in England, began in the 12th century, but the custom did not make much headway until two or three centuries later.

Because of the early influence of the Bible and the church, kings, emperors and popes go only by their first, given or Christian names; but they have family names. Even yet the pastor or priest baptizes one as simply Mary, John, etc.

In earlier times, and even as late as Colonial times in America, there were sometimes two or three girls, or two or three boys, of the same given name in the same family.

More than 400 books have been written on onomastic science (the science of names). There are more than 50,000 family names in the United States.

In most of the States you cannot arbitrarily change your surname (in some states even the spelling of it) without the permission of some court of law.

A patronymic (Greek), literally "father-name," is a name derived from a parent or ancestor, usually a parent. It is sometimes a prefix, sometimes a suffix. Thus: M(a)c (Gaelic or Celtic), as in Mc Caleb (son of Caleb); O'Dell; Johnson; Fitzhugh (Fitz being an earlier French form of fils, son); Christianson, or -sen, English and Scandinavian.

If a Russian or Czech man's name is Pavlov, his wife's name, also that of the girls in his family, is Pavlova.

All family names mean something, or did, originally. Wherever the meaning is vague or unknown, it means that the name has undergone so many changes that its original form is unknown, or that the word has long since become obsolete.

Americans usually mispronounce titles, or "particules" in names. In England it is Suh Winston; not Sir Winston; Sin James, not St. James; Sin Clair, not St. Clair. The stress falls on the word following Suh and Sin. In like manner consider the French and Spanish de, Italian di, German von, and Dutch van.

Double given names and fancy given names began about the beginning of the 19th century. Practically none of the American patriots and statesmen of the Revolution had double given names. Only three or four of our presidents had family names not English: Van Buren, Roosevelt, and Eisenhower; Hoover may be Dutch.

Before President Grant only three presidents carried double given names: John Quincy Adams, William Henry Harrison, and James K. Polk.

Among the Chinese the family name always comes first: thus, Chiang Kai Shek.

(Dr. Combs's Paper continued):

There are more than 1,000,000 Smiths in the United States, or one to every 88 Americans. But slightly more than one half of these can trace their ancestry to the British Isles. In German it is Schmidt, or Schmied; in Scandinavian, Smed; Czech, Kovar; Hungarian, Kovac; Polish, Kowalczyk; Syrian, Haddad.

The Jews resisted surnames until the beginning of the 19th century. In Austria they were compelled to adopt surnames late in the 18th century."

"There are here the probate records of scores of people with the surname PENDLETON since 1561 and, of course, there are countless references to them in the parish registers, many of which are also here. It is quite impracticable for the staff of this Office to undertake research, but the documents are readily available should you or anyone on your behalf find it convenient to come here. We are, of course, always ready to deal with specific questions which do not entail much research.

I should point out that there are two townships in Lancashire called PENDLETON, one near Manchester and one near Burnley. Any families moving out of either of these places in the 14th and 15th centuries would probably be given PENDLETON as their surname, indicating as it did their place of origin. It is absolutely certain, therefore, that HENDLETON families of today are not necessarily related to each other however far back one can trace them."

EXCERPTS FROM PAPER, "THE HUGUENOTS OF TEXAS," BY CULLUM GREENE, PRESIDENT OF THE TARRANT COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY, PRESENTED TO THE FORT WORTH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, NOVEMBER 24, 1958:

"From the Book of Proverbs comes this significant passage, 'A goodly man leaveth an inheritance to his children's children.'

Certainly those who can point, genealogically, to a Huguenot background can also point with pride to this quotation from the Book of Psalms, 'I have a goodly heritage.'

This matter of heritage (inheritance) is something that is earned and in no sense can be attributed to an honorary degree granted in lieu of monetary or civic contributions.

It is a heritage earned through spilled blood which points up the determined devotion to the beliefs that Huguenots had, devotions to the same beliefs which form the foundations upon which this nation of ours is built.

And history records that many of those who helped lay the foundations of this great nation of ours were men, and women, too, whose roots sprang from those we call Huguenots.

General George Washington, General Lafayette, Peter Fanueil (Fanueil Hall, the cradle of Liberty), Paul Revere, Capt. Jack Juetta and many others. Captain Juetta was another Paul Revere who raced through the night to warn Governor Thomas Jefferson of the Red Coats approach.

But the Huguenot heritage did not stop with the Revolutionary War. It came on down to modern times with names such as that of General Pershing of World War I fame.

Among the families on the Mayflower were the Mullinses, ancestors of Priscilla, who married John Alden, who also was of Huguenot lineage.

Eight presidents other than George Washington traced their heritage to the Huguenots. Most recent of these were Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman, the latter being descended from Mareen Duval, said to have been the most outstanding of the Huguenots who settled in Maryland about 1659.

These are but a few of the forty or fifty thousand Huguenots who fled from persecution in France to the New World, men and women whose descendants today still carry on the traditions and continue the heritage willed to them by their forebears.

French Huguenots probably did more to establish the three basic freedoms than any other people. Let's never call them a sect. They were a people. Not uneducated or poor people, but princes, nobles, scholars, artists, skilled artisans and members of the various professions.

(Huguenot Paper continued:)

In their establishment of these three basic freedoms--freedom of thought, freedom of political beliefs and freedom of religion, Huguenots stood with their lives against the oppression and licentiousness of the ruling kings and priests. Theirs was truly a belief in the open Bible.

Though there are many side issues connected with their start, it can be truthfully said that Huguenots owe their heritage to that great reformer, John Calvin, or Cauvin as he was known when still in France--before he had been exiled to Switzerland because of his beliefs.

It was dissemination of Calvin's famous 'Institutes of Christian Religion' that formed the basis for Huguenots.

There are many interesting, intriguing stories about Huguenots and their part in the New World because they really helped build up the history of the nation. For example, it was a Huguenot, Peter Minuit, who bargained with the Indians for Manhattan Island for the sum of \$24 worth of knives, beads, and trinkets.

Virginia, New York and many other states are filled with stories as interesting, but none more so than that which occurred in South Carolina, with emphasis on Charleston.

Started as a Lords Proprietor settlement under a grant by Charles II of England, Charleston became a Huguenot stronghold and an example of what real ability can do for a community.

They came to Charleston at a time when the Lord Proprietors were looking for people skilled in the trades. They accepted their responsibilities and soon took over the life of the city. Names such as Laurens, Legare, Poinsett, Manigault and Izard, all Huguenots, stood out as the top families of Charleston's commercial, social, and political life.

They were the real aristocrats of this part of the New World.

The Revolution cut Charleston back, but with such a determined people, it bounced up again to vie for top position in the South with New Orleans.

The Civil War saw Charleston go down again, but even today it lives midst its glorious past.

Many of those who occupied top places in Charleston are known for various accomplishments, but none any more than Joel Poinsett. For it was he who brought back from Mexico, where he served as the United States first minister, a plant that today has become symbolic of Christmas--the Poinsetta.

For many years there have been Huguenot societies in various parts of the nation. Only recently has a chapter of the Huguenot Society been organized in Fort Worth. The president of the Huguenot Society of Texas, Mrs. Marvin C. Nichols, lives here and is a member of this Fort Worth Genealogical Society.

(Huguenot paper continued:)

Those of Huguenot descent can very well applaud this statement--
'The principles for which these people died--political and economic
justice, education and spiritual freedom--are the hope of the world.'"

GENEALOGY FROM AUSTRIA:

KARL FRIEDRICH von FRANK, Schloss Senftenegg, Post Ferschnitz, Niederosterreich, Austria, writes (22 October 1958), as follows:

"Referring to page 6 of your Bulletin of Sept. 1958, I may mention that the original spelling of ECHTRAUNACH is ECHTERNACH. This is a rare surname, derived from the town Echternach in Luxemburg. According to my card indexes, it occurs in Rhine-Hesse.

Only the following immigrants of this surname are known:

- 1) MATTHEUS ECHTERNACH who landed at Philadelphia 27. IX. 1749
- 2) CHRISTIAN ECHTERNACH who landed at Philadelphia 12. XII. 1768

Obviously also the surname of HERSHHLISER is of German origin. It's original spelling might have been HERSCH- or HIRSCHHAUSER meaning: the one of the stag-house. This is also a rare surname.

Finicle, perhaps might have been FINCKLE which, in the Alemannic idiom is the diminutive of FIN(C)K.

BRANDENBERGER came from Switzerland..."

COUNT OR NO 'COUNT:

In a recent issue of the NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY QUARTERLY its brilliant editor, Milton Rubincam, stated that the title of Count in the Holy Roman Empire, granted to Thomas Arundell of Wardour Castle, Wilts., by the Emperor Rudolph II, was to be inherited in the male line only. These are not Mr. Rubincam's exact words, but he inferred that on no account could the female lines count on a title under this patent.

We rushed a letter to his attention, % John Frederick Dorman, in which we quoted from pages 240-241, ANNE ARUNDEL GENTRY, by Harry Wright Newman, "Thomas, son of Matthew and Margaret (Willoughby) Arundel-Howard, spent his early life on the Continent, especially in Germany and served in the Imperial Hungarian Army against the Turks. He was created by Rodolph II, Emperor of Germany, a Count of the Holy Roman Empire. The patent of creation, dated Prague, December 14, 1595, conferred the honor upon 'you Thomas and all and every one of your children, heirs, and legitimate descendants of both sexes already born or that ever hereafter shall be'.
