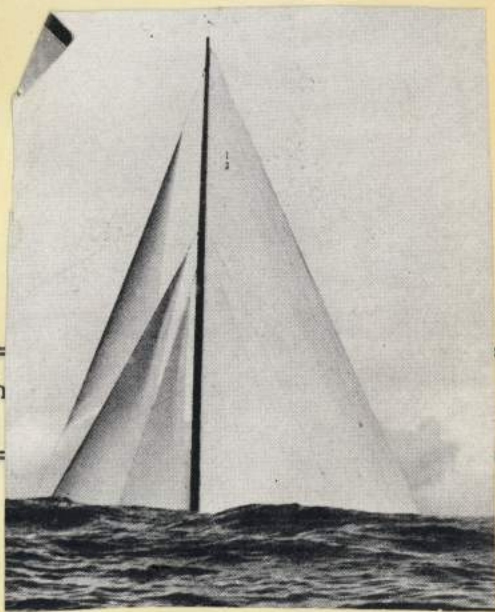

# Local Snipe Racers One-Two In State Meet at White Rock

Beating his rival by a good length in the run-off of a tie, Lloyd Jones of Dallas sailed his No. 138 to victory on White Rock Lake Sunday afternoon to walk off with the Texas snipe class sailing championship. The race climaxed an all-afternoon program run as the second annual State championship. The loser in the finals was B. Williams, also of Dallas, and sailing No. 26. Jones' craft won in the fine time of 34 minutes for the three-mile journey.

Williams and Jones finished the regular three-heat program in a deadlock with 31 points each based on the number of boats they defeated in each session. D. E. Garnett of Waco, leading visiting sailor, scored 30 points to just miss getting in the run-off. Other point scorers were Bill Bracey, Dallas, 29; Maurice Martin, Dallas, 25; Dick Gozaldi, Dallas, 24; William Gunn, Oklahoma City, 15; Frank Gunn, Oklahoma City, 14; D. Williams, Dallas, 12; Bob White, Dallas, 10; Charles Woodman, Dallas, 9, and H. Blagg, Denton, 3.

In a special event on the program Joe Rumsey navigated a class C catboat representing the Oklahoma City Yacht Club to an easy victory over a 24-foot Dallas-owned scow in which Dr. Hub Isaacs acted as captain and Arthur Launey as helmsman.

## DALLAS CLUB LOSES CLOSE CONTEST TO HOUSTON YACHTERS

Though unfamiliar with the Lipton Fish class boats used by their hosts, the Houston Yacht Club, members of the Dallas Sailing Club gave excellent account of themselves in races Sunday at La Porte, piling up a total of 19 points against 22 for their opponents.

Over a six-mile course, three boats manned by Dallas yachtsmen won 8 points to Houston's 13 during the morning races. The breeze was light and little excitement marked the races. In the afternoon, with a stiff breeze, the race was close and full of action, with Dallas leading the South Texas sailors by 11 points to 9. All six boats in the race finished within fifteen seconds of each other.

The three crews from the Dallas club were Don Maxwell, skipper, with Mrs. Maxwell and Lloyd Jones crew; William Bracey, skipper, with H. K. Doyle and Robert White crew, and Dr. Hub Isaacs, skipper, with Charles Woodman and William Grace crew.

Fifteen members of the local club made the trip and were entertained Saturday and Sunday at the Houston Club house. On Sunday, Sept. 27, members of the Houston club will engage in races on White Rock Lake with the Dallas club as hosts.

# Championship Regatta Slated at White Rock For Sail Boats Today

Trial heats for the first annual Texas championship regatta to be held Sunday at White Rock Lake under the auspices of the Dallas Sailing Club will find fifteen small white sailboats of the snipe class waiting the starter's signal from the official craft that will honor the presence of judges and city officials for the day's program. The opening race will start at 7:15 o'clock and will continue until 5 o'clock that afternoon.

## Drawings Are Made.

Drawings for the trial heats were made Saturday night and listed seven visiting ships of member clubs of the State association that will be allotted along with the eight boats of the local club to the various entrants for the different races. Each contestant is required by national sailing requirements to pilot a different craft for each race, the victor winning by a point scoring system.

J. M. Martin of the Dallas Sailing Club, at the current time the leading scorer in the United States for the snipe class, will enter his boat, Silver Spray, for the competition. Other members of the local club have their boats ready for the regatta and include the following owners and boats: E. E. Montgomery, Pole Star; E. R. Houston, Narca Neath; Charles Woodman, Georgia W; Jim Terry, Star Dust; Jack Cotton, Evangeline, and C. P. Jones, Mary B.

Visiting skippers who will take part in the boating are Gail De Jarnett, Waco; Ralph Blogg, Denton; Merideth Ellis, Fort Worth; C. R. Toms, Waco; E. C. Holton, Fort Worth; Commodore J. Albert Green, Waco; Commodore George Q. McGown, Fort Worth, and Marvin Loveless of Denton.

## Women's Races Carded.

A series of women's races will be held during the day with entrants being listed from all clubs that have entered the men's contest. Prizes will be awarded at the clubhouse after the completion of the final races with awards being made to all winners.

A dinner and dance for members of the club and their guests will be held Saturday night at the clubhouse, which is located on the east side of White Rock Lake.

## Sailing Club to Put on Regatta

The first annual regatta of the Dallas Sailing club will be staged at White Rock lake Sunday, starting at 7:15 in the morning and lasting until 5 o'clock in the afternoon. A series of thrilling events for both men and women drivers have been lined up and there will not be an idle moment all day. Hub Isaacks is the club's commodore.

## Sail Boat Regatta Is On Tap at White Rock Lake Sunday Afternoon

Sail boat racing will be formally introduced to the sports-loving public of Dallas for the first time Sunday at White Rock lake, when the Dallas Sailing club stages its first annual Texas championship regatta. Trial races will start at 7:15 a. m. and will continue throughout the day with the finals slated for the afternoon.

Members of the state association from Waco, Fort Worth, Denton and Dallas will enter boats in the "snipe" division, which limits the entries to boats less than 15 feet, six inches in length. Seven of this type boats are owned by members of the local club which was organized less than a year ago.

The sailing club has an active membership of 35 with a fixed limit of 50. It is quartered in the old White Rock dining hall, which has been purchased and remodeled into a modern clubhouse. A pier has been built for the use of members and shelters a racing boat which belongs to the club.

Dallas will offer several outstanding sailors for the state championship competition. Probably the leading local "tar" is J. M. Martin, who is leading the chase for the national snipe racing crown. The local boatman is considered a good bet to bring the trophy to Dallas, as he has a substantial lead over racers of the United States.

City officials will witness the races from the club officials' boat. Members and their guests will be given a dinner in the clubhouse at 8 p. m.

## REGATTA WILL BE STAGED AT LAKE SUNDAY

### WHITE ROCK TO BE SCENE OF FIRST ANNUAL SAILING CLUB MEET

The Texas championship regatta will be held at White Rock lake Sunday morning at 7:15 o'clock and continuing throughout the day until 5 o'clock in the evening. The Dallas Sailing club will act as host to this first annual meeting of the state association, which includes clubs from Fort Worth, Waco and Denton, all entering boats of the snipe class, 15 feet 6 inches in length, in trials and final races.

J. M. Martin, who is leading the nation in this particular class of boat sailing at the present time, according to the reports of national officials, will lead the Dallas en-

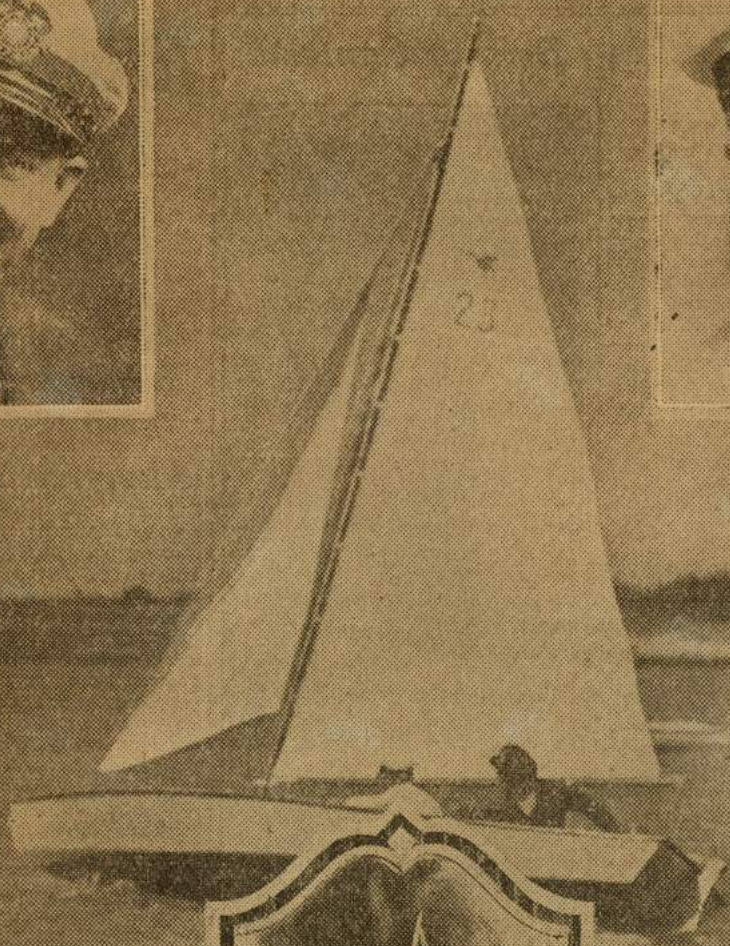

All boats of the class should be registered so that owners may be put in touch with their nearest Divisional Fleets and take part in racing. Racing numbers are assigned to boats that are registered. After registration boats may join Divisional Fleets and receive measurement certificate from the measurer.

The smiling gentleman all togged out in the yachting cap and stars is none other than the Association's head, Commodore Hub E. Isaacks of the Dallas Sailing Club. The commodore is and always has been an ardent sailor and during an eventful life he has even spent "two years before the mast" on a coastwise cargo schooner on the Gulf of Mexico. He is a Lieutenant J.G. in the U. S. Naval Reserve and makes the annual cruise required. He owns the 19 foot sloop Lady on White Rock Lake—which, we think, is aptly named and must come in handy for the Dallas Sailing Club which is located on its shores.

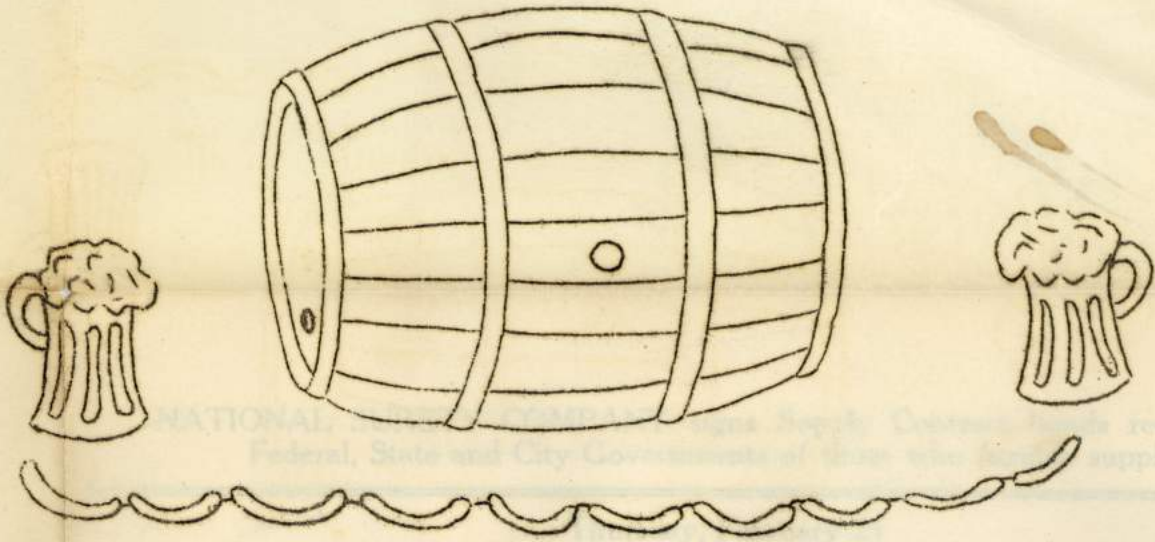

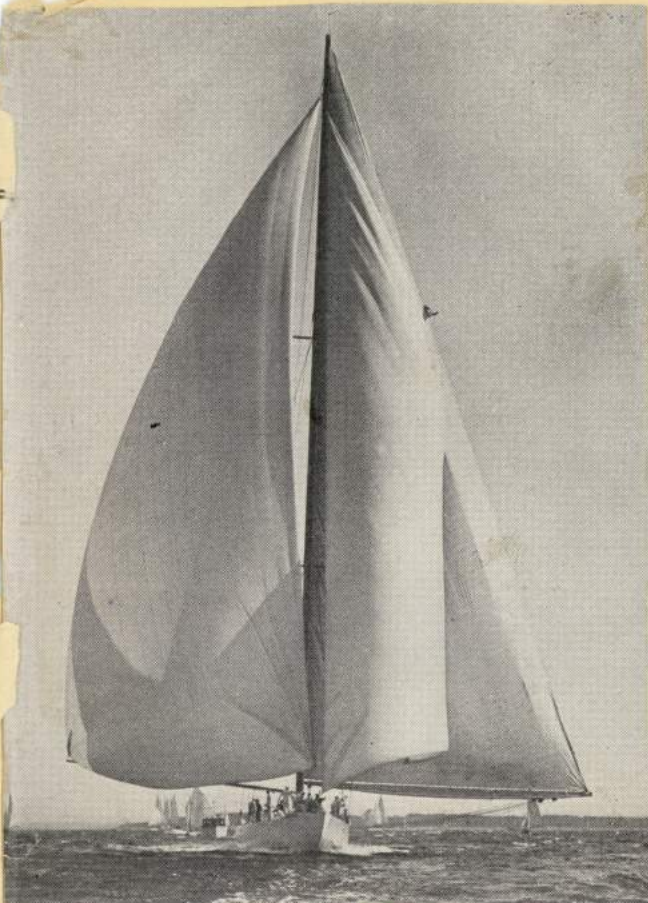

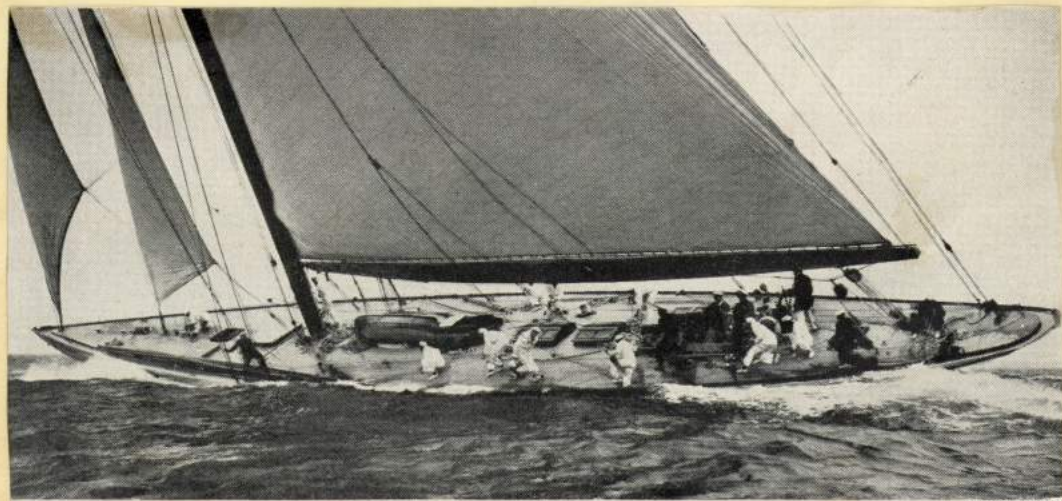
